2021 Winner of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation National Award for Outstanding Epidemiology Practice in Addressing Racial and Ethnic Disparities

Award was presented by the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists for highlighting disaggregated data on substance use and behavioral health disparities among Asian American youth in King County.



### What is Communities Count?

Communities Count (CC) supports communities in the use of data to promote and achieve equity through technical assistance, trainings/workshops, and interpreted data.



## **Interpreted Data & Resources**

Over 22,300 people visited the website representing over 38,500 views



In-depth data interpretation for **9 topic areas with over 40 indicators** 

 New disaggregated data on Asian American youth is available as part of our indicators from the Healthy Youth Survey



Published **5 blog** posts highlighting various equity-related topics including:

- How COVID-19 impacted basic needs, mental health, & social supports
- Racism as a public health crisis
- BIPOC & LGBTQ access to health care during COVID-19
- Experiences of racism from King County communities
